Proposed By-Law Change

Dennis Frost has submitted the following proposed amendment to Article XIII Section 5 of the MCSA By-Laws. We will Vote at the July 11 meeting.

ARTICLE XIII SECTION 5 AS CURRENTLY WRITTEN

5) Other Meetings - Meetings of the Board of Directors and Trustees shall be scheduled upon the call of the President or Chairman of the Board of Trustees, respectively. Notice of such meetings will be posted for the information of the general membership on the bulletin board in the clubhouse. All meetings of the Club shall be open to the general membership with the exception that both the Board of Directors and Board of Trustees may go into Executive Session to discuss particularly sensitive matters e.g. suspension or termination actions, etc.

PROPOSED AMMENDMENT TO ARTICLE XIII SECTION 5

5) Other Meetings - Meetings of the Board of Directors and Trustees shall be scheduled upon the call of the President or Chairman of the Board of Trustees, respectively. Notice of such meetings will be posted for the information of the general membership on the bulletin board in the clubhouse. All meetings of the Club shall be open to the general membership. There will be no meeting or any part of any meeting conducted by any member of the Board of Directors, Trustees, or Committee Chairs that is closed to the general membership regardless of the reason or subject matter for that meeting e.g. suspension or termination actions, etc. Executive Session and Closed Session are examples of closed meetings that are not allowed.


Raffle Central

Frustration and the Range

Frustration is a powerful negative emotion. It by itself is not detrimental but allowing frustration to build and fester it becomes anger and anger IS detrimental.

Why you might ask do we have an article about anger. It is not the anger this article is about but what develops from the anger.

There is a progression of emotions from frustration to anger to rage. If you deal with frustration properly, the following two will not occur. It is important to deal with frustration upfront and properly to thwart anger and rage.

Frustration, in most cases, is easy to deal with. Just step away, take a break, relax and rest. Almost nothing is so important that one cannot step back and take a pause to reflect on the cause of the frustration. The amount of time for reflection is dependent on the amount of frustration and if you are working (for a living) the amount of time allotted for a deadline.

Let's narrow the narrative to shooting at the range. Here there should be no deadline. If there is a deadline then allot twice as much time as you have estimated to accomplish your goal. If your equipment is not functioning as expected then STOP, take a break and think it over. Many times, a short pause, a reset if you will, the problem becomes focused and solutions reveal themselves.

The aforementioned focus on elimination of frustration is the main step to avoid anger followed by rage.

Anger has no place at the range. If you are angry prior to coming to the range do yourself and fellow members a favor and don't come. Anger can quickly develop into a confrontation and confrontation often escalates to misunderstanding, misgivings or tragedy. A confrontation will cost a lot of man-hours in investigating and determining what happened.

Once you enter the state of anger you leave the state of rationality. Anger clouds rational judgement. Things, true or perceived, are said and anger is inflamed and step by step (it's amazing how rapidly it evolves) it develops into a confrontation. If a confrontation does develop take a step back. Do not use words that incite the other person. Once said, they can never be taken back. It is the quickest way to escalate an already bad situation.

So, members, firearms and frustration do not mix. Take steps to eliminate or carefully manage your frustration then anger will be replaced by rational thought and there will be no misgivings. We are all here by choice and we are all armed. Arm yourself with good judgement as well. A win, win.

Washington: Court orders Amendments to Misleading Ballot Title

On June 7, in a defeat for Attorney General Bob Ferguson and Initiative 1639 proponents, the Thurston County Superior Court sided in part with the NRA and found that certain parts of the ballot title were deceptive and misleading. As a result, they ordered amendments to several key provisions of the initiative's ballot title. While the ballot title remains inadequate to inform voters of the real effects of the initiative, the outcome of yesterday's hearings did result in clarifying changes that more accurately describe the sweeping provisions of the initiative's text.

With the title for Initiative 1639 now finalized, proponents of this 22-page initiative will have until July 6th to get 259,622 valid signatures to place the initiative on the November ballot.

<u>As previously reported</u>, NRA filed a legal challenge in Thurston County Superior Court contesting the ballot title language as prepared by anti-gun Washington State Attorney General Bob Ferguson. Yesterday, the court held a hearing on the legal challenges filed by NRA and other petitioners.

Some of the changes included:

- Changing "enhanced" background checks to "increased". Initiative 1639 would require state background checks on all purchases and transfers of commonly owned semi-automatic firearms.
- Added "allows fees" to the description. The proposed initiative would allow the
 Department of Licensing to charge a \$25 purchase fee (GUN TAX) on transfers of semiautomatic rifles.
- Clarified the description for the storage mandate provision. If passed, Initiative 1639 would criminalize firearm owners that store firearms in a non-compliant manner if they are accessed by a prohibited person or minor.

Initiative 1639, filed by Michael Bloomberg's front group, the Alliance for Gun Responsibility, is an egregious attack on Second Amendment freedoms and comes just months after they failed to enact their gun ban agenda in Olympia.

But practically speaking, I believe it will hamper the Board's ability to do their job under certain circumstances and make their already difficult job, that much harder.
